Cartwright's description of Labrador causes a person to simultaneously want to live there but also realize to survive takes special skills and good fortune. His journal has given me a huge appreciation for our ancestors who fished, trapped, hunted for a living and survival. It also helped me see the impact the American revolution had on these poverty stricken people often abandoned by their country oft times unintentionally.

I tried to extract names and location of the individual mentioned to help anyone who might have ancestors from England, Ireland or Labrador. This was my first attempt at extracting names. I hope it is enough to help you break through a brick wall – or an iceberg.
